Gavriela Geller, Executive Director, JCRB|AJC

Antisemitism in 2020: Old Tropes, New Challenges

This session will explore the COVID-19 pandemic's implications on fighting antisemitism in the United States.

Biography:

Gavriela Geller, a native of Kansas City, is the Executive Director of JCRB|AJC. She previously worked for AJC's Belfer Institute for Latino and Latin American Affairs (BILLA), managing a grant from the Ford Foundation. In that capacity, she implemented programs across the country to advance immigration reform and strengthen Latino-Jewish relations. She served as AJC's immigration policy analyst, identifying advocacy opportunities and representing the organization on national immigration coalitions. Most recently, Gavi directed the policy and advocacy efforts of the Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) of St. Louis. She has also worked at the National Immigrant Justice Center helping detained and LGBTQ immigrants as part of Avodah: The Jewish Service Corps. Gavi holds an M.A. in Jewish cultural arts from the George Washington University and is fluent in Spanish. She serves on the Avodah Kansas City Advisory Council.

Henry Bial, Professor of Theatre and Dance, University of Kansas

Jewish on Demand: Representation and Difference in the Streaming Era

How have services like Netflix and Amazon opened the door for a new wave of complex and contested representations of Jewish identity? Contemporary examples (The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel, Transparent, Unorthodox) will be considered in relation to the longer arc of film and TV history.

Biography:

Henry Bial is Professor of Theatre and Dance at the University of Kansas, where he has also served as Director of Jewish Studies. He is the author of *Acting Jewish: Negotiating Ethnicity on the American Stage and Screen and Playing God: The Bible on the Broadway Stage*.

Mark D. Nanos, Ph.D. (University of St. Andrews, Scotland) Lund University, Sweden

What was Paul Contesting about the Role of Torah in His Letter to the Galatians?

Galatians is often cited to contend that Paul was opposed to Jewish identity and behavior guided by Torah as being antithetical to grace and faith. This session will show why those readings do not capture the probable meaning of Paul's arguments, and offer alternatives that make more sense of an early controversial Jewish sect. (Bonus: this will involve discussion of "evil eye" culture in the first-century.)

Biography:

Dr. Nanos is a Jewish historian with a research focus on the Apostle Paul. He is a leading figure in the emerging international school of thought that Paul should be studied as a figure within Second Temple Judaism. He won the National Jewish Book Award in 1996 for his first book, The Mystery of Romans. He has followed up his 2015 co-edited volume, Paul within Judaism, with four volumes of his collected essays. In 2019 he received an Honorary Doctorate at Lund University, Sweden, for his Jewish contributions to New Testament studies. Dr. Nanos earned his Ph.D. from University of St. Andrews, Scotland.

At MCHE she served as the Director of Education and the Associate Director before being named Executive Director in 2020.

Basic Law: Israel as the Nation-State of the Jewish People- Wondering what the problem is

In July 2018, the approval of Basic Law: Israel as the Nation-State of the Jewish People caused several protests organized by Arab citizens of Israel. However, the opposition to the new legislation was derived from two main competing narratives. We will discuss the challenges of this law through the eyes of the Israeli Arabs.

Biography:

Rami Zeedan is an Assistant Professor of Israel Studies in the Jewish Studies Program at the University of Kansas. He has published two books: *Arab-Palestinian Society in the Israeli Political System: Integration versus Segregation in the Twenty-First Century* (Lanham, 2019); and *Battalion of Arab- the History of the Minorities' Unit in the IDF from 1948 to 1956* (Ben-Shemen, 2015) [Hebrew].

Pope Pius XII - Friend or Enemy of the Jews?

There has been much controversy about Pope Pius the 12th. He rescued many Jewish children during the Holocaust, but never publicly condemned the Nazis, even as the head of the Catholic Church. This lecture will delve into the details of these relationships

Biography:

Rabbi Mandl was senior rabbi of Kehilath Israel Synagogue for 36 years. He holds a Ph.D. in Jewish law from the University of Montreal in medieval philosophy, a bachelor's degree from Johns Hopkins University and a master's degree and Rabbinical ordination from the Jewish Theological seminary of America, as well as orthodox ordination

The Cairo Genizah: Sacred Trash and Treasures

The Cairo Genizah (a depository of texts in Hebrew script) was "discovered" in the Ben Ezra synagogue at the end of the 19th century. Thanks to the work of scholars like Schechter and Goitein, the immense collection of documents pertaining to the life of the Jewish communities of the Eastern Mediterranean was preserved. We will learn about the discovery and its significance for Jewish history, then take a close look at some of the most "famous" texts. Some knowledge of Hebrew is recommended.

Biography:

Rabbi Cattapan is a native of Argentina. In Argentina, his education included the Seminario Rabinico Latinoamericano (Conservative) and the University of Buenos Aires, where he studied Ancient and Medieval Philosophy and was a teaching assistant in General Linguistics. He came to the U.S in 1994 to attend Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, Ohio. Rabbi Cattapan received his M. A. in Hebrew Letters in 1997, and was ordained as rabbi at the HUC-JIR in Cincinnati in 1998. In 2004, Rabbi Cattapan earned his M. Phil. in Hebraic and Cognate Studies. After ordination, he taught Modern Hebrew at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. Before coming to Beth Torah, Rabbi Cattapan served synagogues in Indiana and Ohio. He became the spiritual leader as Senior Rabbi of Congregation Beth Torah in Overland Park, Kansas. He is member of the Central Conference of American Rabbis and incoming president of the Rabbinical Association of Greater Kansas City.

Hezbollah-Israeli War 2006: Setting the Stage for Today's Middle East

This session will begin by setting the strategic context in the Middle East prior to the conflict, then discuss the lead-up to the Hezbollah-Israeli War. The War will be analyzed on three levels: Strategic, Operational, and Tactical. The presenter will conclude by presenting how the outcome of the war had multiple effects on the current situation in the Middle East, concentrating on Israeli-Iranian tension.

Bill Greenberg teaches at the University of Foreign Military and Cultural Studies, Fort Leavenworth, KS. Bill is a retired Army officer who served for 28 years in numerous locations around the world, with the majority of time spent in the Middle East.

He is the 2017 recipient of the Harold Holliday, Civil Rights Award from the NAACP.

Shelly M. Cline, Ph. D., Historian and Director of Education for the Midwest Center for Holocaust Education

Propaganda and the People: Lessons from Nazi Germany

This session will look at the evolution of Nazi propaganda beginning with the election of 1932 through the war years. Major topics of the discussion will include creating a "racial" community, indoctrinating youth, and defining the "other."

Biography:

Dr. Shelly Cline is the Historian and Director of Education for the Midwest Center for Holocaust Education. She received her Ph.D. from the University of Kansas in 2014. Her research focuses on the gendered perpetration of the Holocaust, which she has presented at national and international conferences.

Jewish Temporalities

How have Jews experienced and thought about time? In what way do Jewish conceptions of time differ, and (perhaps just as interesting) in what ways have Jews *not* felt it important to have a unique approach to time? The session will address everything from minutes and hours to the scope of history itself.

Biography:

Dr. Brody is an Associate Professor in the Department of Religious Studies at University of Kansas. Samuel Hayim Brody studied Political and Social Thought and Middle-Eastern Studies at the University of Virginia before turning his attention to the study of traditional Jewish sources at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, where he received his M.A. His Ph.D. in the History of Judaism is from the University of Chicago Divinity School, where he focused on the modern German-Jewish intellectual tradition, while also studying philosophical hermeneutics, Christian exegesis, and varying conceptions of the relationship between religion and politics. He has previously taught at the University of Chicago and the University of Cincinnati.

Religious Zionism 101

Zionism began as a largely secular national movement, but one that was still deeply rooted in Jewish religious texts and ideas. We will analyze the thought of religious adherents to Zionism, who were once a minority within that movement, but are now perhaps its most ardent supporters.

Moshe Grussgott is the senior rabbi of Kehilath Israel Synagogue in Overland Park. He has also served as a chaplain and a captain in the US Army Reserve, and was previously the senior rabbi of Congregation Ramath Orah in New York City.

Conversation with Your Palestinian Neighbor

Black Lives Matters teaches the importance of getting to know our Black neighbors. In this session, we will discuss how and why we, as American Jews, can and should get to know our Palestinian neighbors.

Biography:

Dr. Ahmed Awad was born in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia to Palestinian immigrants. Even though he was born in Saudi Arabia, he was not granted Saudi citizenship and was considered a Palestinian refugee. His first recorded citizenship is from the United States. Dr. Awad graduated with his Medical degree in 1994 from Kansas City University, and went on to complete an internal medicine residency & nephrology fellowship at University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Medicine. Today, Dr. Awad is an Assistant Professor of Medicine at the University of Missouri, Kansas City and has been practicing medicine for over 20 years. Currently, he practices at Kansas City Kidney Consultants and is a Private Consulting Nephrologist at St. Luke's Health Systems in Kansas City. Dr. Awad has been happily married to Ameneh Paziresh for 27 years and they have three children together- Neda, Ameen, and Hana.

Ameneh Paizresh was born and raised in Shiraz, Iran and was the 7th of 9 siblings. She moved to the United States at 18, to pursue her dream of continuing an advanced education. Ameneh attended the University of Missouri Kansas City where she met her husband, Ahmed Awad. She graduated in 1992, with top honors, from their School of Pharmacy. Ameneh has been working as a pharmacist for 27 years. Today, Ameneh co-owns Clinical Research Consultants (CRC) alongside her husband, Dr. Awad, since its opening in 2009. Ameneh is the Vice President and Operations Manager of CRC, where she conducts phase I, II, III, and IV clinical trials. Ameneh is a mother of three wonderful children, and one family cat, Nala.

Sheila Sonnenschein has been working to build relationships between people of different faiths and cultures since 2002. She is a past chair and vice-chair of the Greater Kansas City Interfaith Council and has planned a variety of multi-faith programs for the Council and community. She served as an advisor and board member to the KC Interfaith Youth Alliance, which included mentoring teens to plan multiple peace walks. Sheila is a board member of the Sisterhood of Salaam Shalom, an organization that brings Jewish and Muslim women together to build trust and friendship. She has chaired three Sisterhood Building Bridges trips: a Civil Rights trip to the American South; to Berlin and Poland; and, to the border with Tucson to learn about issues affecting people seeking asylum. Sheila, along with her husband, Ken, enjoys gardening, traveling, and hosting people from around the world at their dinner table (when there isn't a pandemic!). Both are the proud parents of four grown children.

Ken Sonnenschein is board certified in both General Psychiatry and Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and is a Fellow of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry. He is the founder and chair of Bike for the Brain, a bicycle ride and walk held each Labor Day to raise awareness and funds for mental health. Ken also founded and chairs Mitzvah Garden KC, which grows and provides fresh organic produce to area food pantries. He has worked with a group to



promote the use electric vehicles in the KC metro area, and co-founded All In for Skin, an event to raise college scholarship funds for children whose lives were affected by melanoma. He believes it's important to learn about people different from us and to have honest dialogue. Ken, along with his wife, Sheila, did the Israel Ride on a tandem to raise funds for Hazon, a Jewish environmental organization and the Arava Institute, which brings Israelis, Palestinians, North Americans and people from around the world to study, research, and learn that "the environment knows no border."

Dr. Majdi Hamarshi completed his medical education In 2003 at AL-Quds medical school in East Jerusalem, after that he worked at Al-Quds medical school as teaching and research assistant. Then, in 2006, he moved to the US to complete his internal medicine residency at the University of Illinois in Chicago. Then he completed his fellowships in geriatrics medicine at Northerwestern University and critical care medicine at University of Missouri Kansas City "UMKC", respectively. Currently he is an associate clinical professor at UMKC, and practices critical care in Kansas City area. In 2015 Dr. Hamarshi has founded the Palestinian American Medical Association (PAMA) which started in Kansas City and now is a national organization. PAMA aims to promote healthcare in Palestine.

Alan Edelman is a native of Kansas City. He received his Bachelor's Degree in Child Development and Education from the University of Kansas, spending his junior year at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Alan attended the Jewish Theological Seminary, New York City, where he received his Master's Degree in Jewish Education. He also holds a Master's Degree in Education Policy and Leadership from the University of Kansas. Alan's research focused on restructuring the congregational religious school by integrating informal and family activities into the educational program. From 1977-1980 he served as Educational Director, Congregation Beth Shalom in Kansas City. Alan then spent two years as Regional Director of Central States/Provinces Region of the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism, consulting with congregations as well as coordinating regional youth activities. On July 1, 1982 he began serving as Executive Director of the Central Agency for Jewish Education of Greater Kansas City (CAJE), a committee of the Jewish Federation. On October 1, 1994, Alan's responsibilities with the Jewish Federation were expanded to include community planning, human resource development, identity and engagement, and Israel/Overseas, assuming the role of Associate Executive Director until his retirement in June 2017. Alan has served on a number of local, regional and continental advisory committees. His volunteer efforts are focused on inter-faith and multi-cultural programming. Alan has served as guest theologian in many churches, universities and seminaries. He has also served on the board of directors for the Midwest Center for Holocaust Education and Notre Dame de Sion School of Kansas City and currently serves as the Jewish Director of the Greater Kansas City Interfaith Council. He is also active in the pursuit of peace between Israelis and Palestinians. He currently serves as the Jewish Director on the Greater Kansas City Interfaith Council as well a member of the board of directors of the Center for Practical Bioethics, Avodah, EmberHope, Schechter Institute and The Florence Melton School of Adult Jewish Learning. Alan and his wife, Debbie Sosland-Edelman, have three children, Alex, Katja and Jonathan and on June 14, 2014 another child came into his life when his daughter married Ari Fine. Katja and Ari made Alan a proud grandfather when Noa Dorit joined the family in August of 2017 and Kobi Zev joined the family in December of 2019.

In Dire Straits: The Second Lebanon War and its Echoes

The Second Lebanon War was a watershed moment in modern Israeli and Middle Eastern History. Viewed by Israel as both a victory and a defeat, the war left a complicated legacy. This session will provide an introduction to the politics, diplomacy, and military history of the war, as well as its legacies.

Biography:

Dr. Jacob Stoil is a military historian and Assistant Professor of Military History at the US Army School of Advanced Military Studies (SAMS). He received his doctorate in history from University of Oxford. He holds a B.A. in War Studies, as well as an M.A. in History of Warfare from the Department of War Studies at King's College London. He has published on indigenous force cooperation, the Second World War, and the Israeli military. He is one of the founders of the International Working Group on Subterranean Warfare. Dr. Stoil is an Assistant Director of the Second World Research Group North America.

Dr. Rebecca Shimoni-Stoil is an Assistant Professor of History at Clemson University. Dr. Stoil is a former NCO in the Israel Defense Forces, where she served as a combat medic and medical platoon deputy commander in the 9th Battalion of the Armored Corps. As a reservist, Shimoni-Stoil was a heavy search and rescue medic with the Home Front Command, mobilizing in the Northern Sector during the Second Lebanon War. After leaving her regular service, Dr. Shimoni-Stoil was hired by the Jerusalem Post and served as the newspaper's Internal Security correspondent. She later held the position of Knesset [Parliamentary] Correspondent before becoming the Washington Correspondent for Times of Israel.
